Tackling climate change Slinfold

We would like the community to get involved in an exciting new initiative starting in 2020 called SLINFOLD 100. The aim is to plant 100 new trees in the parish next year and every year thereafter for as long as it is feasible.

Tree planting 'has mind-blowing potential' to tackle climate crisis. Billions more trees, scientists claim, could remove two-thirds of all the carbon dioxide created by human activity. Such a programme might take 100 years to be fully effective, but along the way it would reduce the consequences of the climate crisis — protecting soil from erosion, reducing the risk of flooding and providing

habitats for a vast range of animals and other plant species.

We would like to think that Slinfold could play a small part in saving the planet. Alongside tree planting, we also have a budget to purchase some bat and owl boxes, all we need now is a group of 'tackle climate change volunteers' to work alongside the Parish Council to make this happen.

Chairman's report by Chairman Neil Beer



As we approach the end of 2019, I would like to thank all Councillors, our Parish Clerk, Environment Officers and many volunteers for the time and effort they put in to help our local community.

Our Youth Club keeps going strong - with some 40 young people attending some weeks. Many thanks to the youth workers and to the volunteers who support this important service.

Planning has been a major part of the work of the Council this year. Development has started on the Spring Lane site, which was included in the Neighbourhood Plan. An application is being prepared for the Crosby Farm site, and the Council's views are being taken into account, particularly on footpaths, through early discussions. Re-development at the former Welwyn site is progressing: the Council is aware of the consequent disruption to local residents and is pleased to advise that we are working with the developer to minimise this. Once the access road has been completed, there should be fewer vehicles trying to park on Hayes Lane. The Council is aware of two other applications for major developments: an application has been submitted for a care village, Lyons Farm, which the Council is objecting to, and a residential development north of Park

Street and west of Clapgate Lane, for which an application has not yet been submitted. The Council is opposed to both of these as they are not part of our Neighbourhood Plan. Horsham District Council is beginning a review of the District's Local Plan, which will no doubt affect our Neighbourhood Plan and we may need to review this next year.

Councillors have been trying to get improvements made to the drainage on and around Hayes Lane. The gullies, trash screens and drain covers have been cleared on a number of occasions and I hope that local residents have seen and will respond to requests for them to help keep these clear. We are exploring options to improve the drainage as part of the Welwyn development, and will be discussing other options with West Sussex County Council in December.

In recent months there have been intensive discussions between the Parish Council, Horsham District Council, Saxon Weald and the Slinfold Scouts about potential options for the Scout Hut, Saxon Weald will be re-developing the Cobblers soon – which will be a great improvement as the present accommodation is outdated, and we are trying to ensure that the re-development will deliver a number of smaller units to meet the needs of local residents. particularly elderly people. As part of this, it may be possible to improve the present Scout Hut or to build a new one. Nothing has been finalised yet, but any such arrangement is going to be complex, and will require significant

funding. See the article from the Scouts below, I hope you will help if you can.

There are new, and energetic, tenants at the Red Lyon. It is good to see the pub being revitalised, and it's usually busy whenever I go past. As we approach the holiday season, drop in (or drop in again!). Very best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Community Highways Scheme for Traffic Calming

In 2018, you may recall that the Parish Council submitted an application to West Sussex County Council (WSCC) for a community highways scheme for the centre of the village. It was hoped that a scheme could be introduced to slow traffic down and improve safety. Unfortunately Slinfold's scheme proposal scored a total of 36 points and therefore failed to meet WSCC's minimum requirement of 40.

This year we have met with Chris Stark, Area Highways Manager, WSCC and our County Councillor, Christian Mitchell to discuss our needs in more detail. It is hoped that we can make a further proposal in 2020 that may have a better chance of meeting requirements and progressing to a design and cost stage. The scheme could improve sustainable transport and may include a new 20 mph speed limit, improved gateways and road markings, new build-outs and a raised table in the centre of the village as well as making improvements to cycling and walking opportunities, all of which will need to be sustainable and safe.

In the meantime we would like to hear from you as to whether you may be in support or against such a scheme.

Development of land at Clapgate Lane and Stane Street Have Your Say

The Parish Council has been advised that a publication on behalf of Seaward Properties has been mail-dropped around the parish. This publication is misleading as it would suggest that these developments are supported by Slinfold Parish Council. Please note that this is not the case and this was conveyed quite clearly to the developer and their agent at the July 2019 full council meeting.

To clarify one early point made in the mail drop i.e. the point regarding 'kindly being invited to present', this suggests that it was at the Parish Council's request that Seaward Ltd present their schemes. This was not the case, in fact it was Seaward Properties Ltd who in June 2019 asked if they could come along to present their proposal to the Parish Council. The Parish Council agreed to this request and at the July meeting, with an open forum attended by around 30 members of the public, two schemes for 280 dwellings were presented.

Objections raised at the July meeting included: -

- Not in the Neighbourhood Plan and outside the village boundary
- · Concern for flooding;
- Access to the developments are not practical;
- No consideration to the infrastructure required e.g. schools, doctors etc. Slinfold could not sustain further large developments.

A low response rate could possibly indicate that Slinfold is not averse to the development that Seaward is proposing so please make your views known (good or bad). Calling all Riparian Owners of Ditches in the Parish – WSCC Awareness Initiative for Riparian Owners

A little more information in case you are not familiar with Riparian Ownership...

If you have a watercourse, ditch, stream, river or culvert on or next to your land you are known as a 'riparian owner'. Riparian owners are responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of watercourses on their land to ensure that they are not a flood risk to other people or property. Well maintained watercourses can significantly benefit the local community by reducing flood risk and creating habitats for wildlife.

The riparian responsibilities for landowners under law are to:

• Ensure the flow of water is not obstructed or polluted

- Maintain the bottom and sides of the watercourse (including managing any trees and vegetation growing on the banks)
- Remove any obstructions, such as rubbish, fallen branches or garden waste
- Maintain any structures (such as trash screens, culverts, weirs and mill gates) on it.

Winter draw(er)s on... all ready for winter



There are five salt/grit bins in the parish: by the bus shelter, on the corner of Lowfield Road and Streetfield Road, at the entrance to Six Acres, outside The Village Hall and opposite the Chequers Inn, Rowhook. These have now been filled but if they require a refill then please contact the Parish Clerk.

The bins contain a mixture of salt and grit that is intended primarily for use on public footpaths that have not been treated. It is not intended for use on private areas of land. We would encourage residents to help themselves to a bucket or small bag of salt/grit and clear the area outside their properties when pavements are slippery with snow or ice. No one should fear legal action if someone falls and is injured, so long as the clearance does not make the condition of the pathway

more dangerous.

In the event of flooding, please contact the emergency services as appropriate, and West Sussex County Council if drains are blocked and need urgent attention. The Parish Council has a small supply of flood sacks should your property be at risk out of business hours. Flood sacks can be purchased from Travis Perkins (Crawley and Pulborough) during business hours.

Please note that our Environment Officers Tim and Jon — pictured below will be out and about clearing the main footpaths in the village but if you can't get out in the event of severe weather conditions and require assistance please contact me on 01403 785864 and we shall do our very best to help.

The Parish Council is keen to hear from any vulnerable people in the village who may need support during severe weather. If you, or a neighbour, would welcome a call during severe weather just to check that all is well, please provide details to the Parish Clerk (01403 785864).



MONEY MATTERS



Annual Accounts to 31 March 2019 and Precept Requirement 2020-21

The Parish Council's annual accounts to 31 March 2019 have been signed off by Moore, the external auditors, and are available on our website www.slinfold-pc.gov. uk under "Accounts". The accounts detail all income and expenditure for the financial year.

The precept is the amount of Council Tax requested by the Parish Council from Horsham District Council (HDC). For 2020-21, there will be an inflationary increase of £1.87 per year from £63.18 to £65.05 (3.5p per week) or 2.96% for a Band D property.



Next time you step outside onto the public footpath from your home take the opportunity to see if your hedge overhangs a footpath or road. Look upwards too; are there low level overhanging branches which could cause head injury or are blocking road signs? You run the risk of formal notice from the County Council if you fail to keep overhanging vegetation under control, and could even face legal action from an injured member of the public. If branches or hedges are overhanging please make arrangements to have them cut.
